Johns Hopkins Video Project:

The Williams County Health Department received a technical assistance grant from Johns Hopkins University to help answer questions about COVID-19 vaccines that we have heard in our community. Interviews were conducted with local residents over Zoom and in-person, and animation videos are being developed to answer common questions. Last week, we completed the final interviews and, after the animation videos are complete, we will share these resources with Williams County. This will be a very helpful tool to help people get the answers they need before they make decisions about vaccinations.

New Booster Recommendations:

Following action by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) and Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) on Tuesday, March 29th, people in the following higher-risk categories may choose to receive a second booster dose to strengthen protection, based on their individual benefits and risks: (source: Ohio Department of Health)

• **People age 50 and older** who received an initial mRNA booster dose (Pfizer or Moderna) at least **four months** ago **MAY RECEIVE a second booster dose** of an mRNA COVID-19 vaccine. A second booster dose may be most beneficial for people who are age 65 and older, or who are age 50-64 with certain underlying medical conditions.

• People age 12 and older who are moderately to severely immunocompromised (<u>https://bit.ly/3wVzjnr</u>) who received an initial mRNA booster dose (Pfizer or Moderna) at least four months ago MAY RECEIVE a second

booster dose of an mRNA COVID-19 vaccine (Pfizer, age 12+; Moderna, age 18+). This means individuals age 12 years and older who are moderately to severely immunocompromised may receive as many as five doses – the recommended three-dose primary series for people who are immunocompromised, plus two booster doses.

 In addition, based on a newly published CDC report, adults who received a primary vaccine and booster dose of the Johnson & Johnson (Janssen) COVID-19 vaccine at least 4 months ago MAY RECEIVE a second booster dose using an mRNA COVID-19 vaccine.

The CDC and FDA will continue to evaluate if a second booster dose will be recommended for any other populations.

Direction of the Community Talking Points

Below are some programs and updates that may be of interest.

WILLIAMS COUNTY CHILD PASSENGER SAFETY PROGRAM

The WCHD has Certified Child Passenger Safety Technicians (CPSTs) available to make sure your child is riding safely in vehicles.

AVAILABLE SERVICES:

- FREE car seat checks
- FREE car seats for eligible families

Car Seat Program – Did you know that more than half of all car seats are installed incorrectly?

The WCHD has a child passenger safety program available to help caregivers ensure that their children are safe while in vehicles. Our Child Passenger Safety Technicians (CPSTs) will check your child's car seat to make sure it is properly installed. CPSTs are trained to provide caregivers education about transporting children in vehicles as safely as possible. The program offers any Williams County residents free car seat checks and education. Some families are also eligible to receive free car seat check or learn more about the program. www.williamscountyhealth.org/car-seats/

Williams County 2022 Community Health Assessment:

Every three years, the Williams County Health Partners, a coalition of local Williams County agencies, conducts surveys to learn more about Williams County adults and youth and the factors that affect their health. This year, the coalition has been working to review the questions and send surveys to a randomized group of Williams County residents. The data will be compiled and analyzed by a third party consultant. The final report will be available for all Williams County residents to bring in new funding for Williams County initiatives. It is also used to improve current Williams County programs.
